"While we may occasionally make light, for the sake of our sanity, about our annual road trip down the true highway to hell, the reality is that the conditions of Maine roads are shameful, costly and dangerous. Blame who or what you will, but the crumbling pavement across Maine creates an impression of a state and its municipalities unable to take care of the most basic infrastructural needs. A pothole is one thing, a complete disintegration of large portions of roadway is another and is something the folks in Augusta need to address, hopefully with some level of bi-partisanship."

We all know the condition of our roads and bridges, the question should be - why do we allow it? We need to spend <u>our</u> limited transportation dollars on <u>our</u> existing and failing infrastructure and not one cent on any new pet project; stop the Presque Isle Bypass and the I-395/Route 9 Connector projects immediately and reprogram those critical funds to fix what obviously needs to be fixed <u>right now</u>.

DOT's recent remarks: "We are over a hundred million dollars shy each year on projects each year, including capital projects, of where we would like to be. So, we're forced to prioritize our roads."

The \$61 million saved by cancelling the I-395/Route 9 Connector project can be better spent on the unmet transportation needs of the state of Maine.
