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Congress Should Have Courage to Make Our Roads and Bridges Safe, Protect Jobs, By Fixing the Highway Trust Fund Crisis

Washington, D.C. (July 15, 2014) – Terry O'Sullivan, General President of LIUNA – the Laborers' International Union of North America – made the following statement today regarding the passage of a short-term patch to the Highway Trust Fund in the U.S. House:

While America should be relieved that Congress appears to be moving to prevent a complete collapse of the Highway Trust Fund next month, law-makers have no excuses for abdicating their responsibility to pass a long-term, full-investment bill.

The direction Congress is moving does nothing to address the safety of motorists, jobs at risk and economic competitiveness. One in four of our nation's bridges will remain deficient or obsolete. Poor road conditions will continue to contribute to a third of traffic fatalities – about 10,000 lives needlessly lost each year.

There is still time to pass a long-term reauthorization this year, but Congress needs the courage to get past politics, to find the ability to lead and to develop the will to make our roads and bridges safe by fixing them – not duct-taping them.

While a number of members of Congress have had the courage and conviction to address the need for long-term investment in America's crumbling infrastructure, too many in both chambers cower at the thought of taking a vote that will actually move our nation forward.

LIUNA will continue to support the true leaders who will fight for these solutions.


If Congress does not act, the nation's already failing roads and bridges will worsen.

Currently:

- One in four bridges is deficient or obsolete, according to the American Society of Civil Engineers. The average U.S. bridge
 is 46 years old, dangerously close to the average lifespan of 50 years. Without investment, more bridge failures are likely
 such as the high-profile ones that have occurred from the deadly Minneapolis bridge collapse to the I-5 collapse in
 Washington State to this month's closure of the heavily-traveled I-495 Delaware bridge after it was observed tilting.
- Poor road conditions, such as potholes, are now a contributing factor in a third of traffic fatalities, equating to about 10,000 lost lives each year, according to the transportation research group, TRIP.

Last week, LIUNA released a national poll by Hart Research Associates, which uncovered the degree of concern most Americans have about their roads. About six in 10 say they worry about poor road conditions – 27% of them worrying often.

Four in 10 say they or someone they know has almost had an accident or lost control of their car due to poor road surfaces, and 28% say poor roads have caused an accident involving themselves or someone they know. And a striking 69% say poor roads cost them in wear and tear on their cars – a "pothole penalty" that equates to \$324 a year for the average driver, according to TRIP. Experiences and concerns are similar regardless of political party.


